


EWB PITT MONTHLY

International Project

Our international project in Tapagem, Brazil was closed this past year due to a change in leadership within the community. As a collective, the community decided that they were no longer interested in our project. Although EWB Pitt will not be able to implement our final designs in Tapagem, we plan to reflect on our project and share the lessons we learned by writing a case study.

The public health team is working on the case study, in hopes that we can publish our findings and share our experiences with other EWB chapters. We understand that while we always strive to see projects through to the end, we can use projects that have not been as successful to improve our process and increase our success in the future. As we begin to start the new international project there will be many new projects we start to work on in preparation for working with the community. We are really excited to get started on this new opportunity!

We are excited to announce that we have a new community partner in Ocotona, Nicaragua! It is located in Nueva Segovia, Nicaragua which is in the north west of Nicaragua, bordering Honduras. This project will be focused on providing clean water to the community, but we do not know yet if that will be in the form of a pump, well, or filtration system. Although we have a lot of work ahead of us, we have a great set of mentors and members who are eager to begin this new partnership!





Local Projects

Last semester, the Local Projects team partnered with GTECH to successfully design and build a stormwater cistern system that collects rainwater off of the Riverview United Presbyterian Church roof. The students who worked on this project were excited to have the opportunity to get involved and see the positive impact they can make right in their own Pittsburgh Community!



Smaller volunteer events included running a booth at the Carnegie Science Center's Chemfest, where club members presented an experiment with acids and bases, and helping out at Free Rides Pittsburgh, where club members tinkered on old bicycles.



Our chapter will continue working with the Oakland Planning and Development Corporation (OPDC) on community improvement projects in South Oakland, as well as the Pittsburgh Professional Chapter of EWB and the Pitt Hydroponics Club. New members are currently joining existing projects, and potential new projects.
